

RPS 2021-06: Toward an Inclusive Social Insurance Coverage in the Philippines: Examining Gender Disparities
by Aubrey D. Tabuga and Carlos C. Cabaero

The Philippines, a country prone to natural calamities and vulnerable to economic fluctuations, has much to accomplish in improving workers' access to social protection. A focus on women's access to social protection programs is crucial because of their significantly lower labor force participation rate than men. Using survey-based data from the Philippine Statistics Authority, this paper looks into the coverage of major social protection programs in the Philippines and examines the circumstances of different types of workers. It identifies the locations of individuals who have no access to social protection programs and belong to the bottom 30 percent of households in the country, as they represent those most in need of government intervention. Furthermore, it examines the social insurance aspect of the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program to gain insights into how the country can improve coverage of social protection programs. DP 2021-18: Social Networks and Access and Utilization of Weather and Climate Information: The Case of Upland Farming Communities in the Philippines

Social norms and structures are vital factors that shape people's behavior and attitudes. It is, therefore, useful to analyze such underlying forces in the creation of strategies that are meant to influence behavior and activities. Agricultural extension services such as information dissemination and farmers' training are some of the interventions that can benefit from such analyses especially within a context of limited human and financial resources. The idea is to use the lessons learned from the analysis of social networks and norms in identifying potential local knowledge and information disseminators, thereby aiding the extension services. It also helps in the formulation of more contextualized approaches for reaching the underserved and hard-to-reach areas. Applying this approach, this study used the case of a remote upland area in Atok, Benguet, a major vegetable producer. This study used social network analysis to develop insights for designing more effective extension strategies. The results show that interventions like information and education campaigns can be improved by acknowledging the nuances in social relation structures. PH's EV Industry has strong potential for growth--PIDS study

The country's electric vehicle (EV) industry has a strong potential for growth, according to a study of state think tank Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS).

In a webinar recently organized by PIDS, Supervising Research Specialist Maureen Ane Rosellon revealed that the global outlook of the EV sector is "very optimistic" given the increasing trend that has been observed in the global fleet for any type of vehicle from 2010 to 2019.

Failure to implement sanitary landfills due to budgetary constraints--DENR official

The implementation of sanitary landfills in the country has not been successful due to limited funds, according to Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Undersecretary Benny D. Antiporda during a webinar conducted by state think tank Philippine Institute for Development Studies.

"It was because of budgetary constraints that sanitary landfills were never successful. In some places, it was successful, but in majority areas of the country ay talaga pong hindi man lang ito naumpisahan," he admitted.

To help local government units (LGUs) with no waste disposal facilities, the DENR promotes the 'clustered sanitary landfill operation system' wherein adjacent LGUs share a single sanitary landfill. [READ MORE](#)



PBEd official highlights data sharing to address K to 12 challenges

Data sharing among stakeholders is crucial to understand the career and educational aspirations of K to 12 graduates and employers' expectations of them.

This was according to Executive Director Lovelaine B. Restrictive procurement policies can impede PH's integration with Asia-Pacific--PIDS study

The country's restrictive policies on foreign investors' participation in public procurement are roadblocks to its integration with the Asia-Pacific region.

This was according to Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS) Senior Research Fellow Francis Mark Quimba and Research Specialist Sylwyn Calizo at a recent webinar jointly organized by PIDS and the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific.

Quimba and Calizo, who presented their study titled "How ready are we? Measuring the Philippines' readiness for digital trade integration with the Asia-Pacific", noted that three restrictions serve as a disincentive to foreign bidders: domestic preference, foreign equity limitations, and local reference requirement. SHS hands-on training, work immersion adapt to the 'new normal'--DepEd official

Education is one of the hardest hit sectors in the country due to quarantine restrictions posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. With this, schools face the challenge of ensuring that classes are not compromised.

Jocelyn Andaya, director of the Department of Education's (DepEd) Bureau of Curriculum Development, said this is important for practical classes that will prepare students for employment.

"One of the challenges during this pandemic is not just delivering quality education but also ensuring that our senior high school (SHS) learners are afforded opportunities for work immersion and hands-on training," Andaya explained during the PIDS webinar titled "Senior High School Graduates' Prospects and Challenges in the Labor Market" where she served as a discussant. Replicate initiatives on Manila Bay solid waste management at the nat'l level—SWM focal

Government initiatives to rehabilitate Manila Bay may be replicated at the national level, according to Maria Agas, solid waste management (SWM) focal of the Department of the Interior and Local Government's (DILG) Manila Bay Clean-up, Rehabilitation, and Preservation Program.

Agas, who served as a discussant during a webinar on SWM recently organized by state think tank Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS), shared that on average, around 90 percent of the 178 local government units (LGUs) in the Manila Bay Area were compliant with the basic provisions of Republic Act 9003 or the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000. 


